# A Statutory Corporation (Fully Subvented)

A 13 Member Council includes: Vice Chancellors, Seasoned HE Experts, Industry representatives, and Government as ex officio.

This mix ensures that our decisions are credible, inclusive, and aligned with national priorities.

Established by an Act of Parliament No 15 of 2011 (Chapter 30:12)

1<sup>st</sup> Council was appointed in February 2012

Commencement Date of 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2012

1<sup>st</sup> Assessments started in 2016

#### Vision


To be a higher education regulator which supports systematic growth and excellence of higher education institutions in Malaŵi.

#### Other Functions of NCHE



- Develop a national qualifications framework that is compatible with regional and international standards;
- Represent the interests of the Malawian higher education regionally and internationally;
- Monitor the implementation of international agreements concerning higher education;

- Promote international cooperation and facilitate exchange in higher education; and
- Advise the Minister on all matters of higher education.

## Country Context and Demographics



- Malawi is located in the Southeastern part of Africa, Landlocked
- Bordered by Tanzania, Mozambique and Zambia
- 22 Million population estimated for 2025
- Youthful population, majority under 25 with a growing demand for tertiary education, vocational training

# Challenges to Transformation

- Despite progress, challenges remain:
  - . Delays in finalising the Malawi Qualifications Framework, which is critical for coherence and recognition
  - . Persistent gender gaps, particularly in STEM fields
  - . Fragmented data environments limiting evidence-based planning
  - . Significant investments required for digital infrastructure, staff upskilling, and innovation systems




# Strategic Direction & Policy Recommendations

- To accelerate transformation, NCHE continues to focus on:
  - . Finalising the Malawi Qualifications Framework
  - . Strengthening digital systems for evidence-based regulation
  - . Advancing Education 5.0 principles to link learning with industry and innovation
  - Expanding research and innovation pipelines through NCST and private sector partnerships
  - . Promoting gender equity in enrolment,
  - . ostering regional collaboration for shared learning and research
